Troop Section Report 2016-2017

Another year has gone by for the Troop. One filled with many experiences, memories, new learning opportunities. Many events were repeats that we do annually (such as Remembrance Day parade, Chinese New Year parade, and Walk with the Dragon) but some were out of the ordinary and offered new experiences to the Scouts. Some of the special events that happened this year involved a link kickoff camp with the cub section, joint winter and competition camps with other groups, a workshop regarding Canada's 150th anniversary and the Chinese culture's history with Canada presented by SFU's Faculty of Arts and Social Science's BEYOND 150 Foundation, and our annual Night Hike at the Pacific Spirit Regional Park.

With the new Canadian Path program structure in place, we aimed to gradually have the Scouts take on more initiative. It was a slow transition but over time the Scouts grew accustomed to making important decisions, planning events, directing the troop, leading activities and more.



In order to improve the Scouts' knot tying skills, Scouter Trevor decided to challenge them to see who could tie the Clove Hitch knot first. Of course it wasn't an easy competition for either side as the more senior Scouts quickly got a hang of it and caught up to Scouter Trevor's speed but never surpassed him.

Another challenge that came to life was a team obstacle course. One person needs to go through the obstacle course blindfolded by following instructions given by their teammates. The second teammate calls out the instructions and cannot see the blind teammate moving. The third teammate is allowed to the see the blind teammate moving but cannot speak and can only communicate through actions and body language. This activity challenged the Scouts' communication skills and teamwork.

This year a number of groups from all over the lower mainland came together to create joint camps such as a winter camp and a competition camp in the spring. Some skills can only be practiced and taught



in conditions you would only find in a deep snow field with trails and mountains around.

Skills such as avalanche danger and safety, snow shelter building, setting up a tent efficiently in the snow, snowshoeing, and learning how to keep warm under such cold conditions were some



of the things that the Scouts learned at this large camp last year. The competition camp pit several Scout groups against each other while challenging their knowledge, wilderness skills, creativity, and tenacity over the course of the camp. It served as a great learning experience as well as a social gathering for the Scouts to meet other members across

Vancouver.

Most importantly, this event allowed Venturers from across different areas to meet, bond, and create memories together. Team building exercises were also an integral part of the camp, giving members of our Company another great opportunity to fulfill one of the yearly goals.



Queen's Venturer Award:



Through hard work and dedication, five members of the Company were able to earn the

Queen's Venturer Award this year. This award is the highest honour that is conferred upon a youth member of Scouting. The Venturers spent countless hours finishing the requirements for the award. The final task was a capstone project. Our Venturers teamed up the Grandview Woodland Community Policing Centre and spent a morning picking up trash and keeping the streets around the neighborhood clean. In April, five of our Venturers were sent to Government House in Victoria, BC to participate in the award ceremony. The members were provided with the amazing opportunity to climb aboard a Royal Canadian Navy Orca Vessel and experience a day in the life of a sailor. Throughout the day the Venturers experienced a capsize drill and a firefighting drill. The day ended on land, where Venturers from across the participated in a picture scavenger hunt around Downtown Victoria. The next day, they had the privilege of being presented the award by The Honourable Judith Guichon, the Lieutenant Governor of BC.

Nite Hike:

Nite Hike, an annual event attended by Scout and Guide groups across British Columbia and Washington State, is where the Venturers showcase their planning and teamwork skills. Working behind the scenes, the Venturers designed challenges to be completed at their Nite Hike station; with the revolving theme of "Nite Hike goes to the zoo." The Venturers created a boot camp style station, where Scouts became recruits at the Zootopia Police Academy. The



first task for the recruits was to retrieve their training equipment from a pond; this task involved the use of wooden poles and teamwork to fish gear off of a tarp, which acted as a pond. The second task was to perform some basic first aid. Using a minimal amount of rope and twine, recruits had to split up a member of their team and carry the

member through an obstacle course. The third task was target training. Using Nerf Guns, recruits began to practice shooting darts at a paper target. The more accurate the shots, the more points the group would earn. Overall, Nite Hike was a success and we will be looking forward to another successful year.

Overall:

The 2016-2017 Scouting year was a very productive term, where many of the goals set by our Venturers were either met or exceeded. The largest achievement for the Venturers was the Queen's Venturer Award. After receiving this award, the Venturers are now able to focus their efforts on other aspects of Scouting, such as giving back. Currently, five of our Venturers are spending some of their weekends supporting the Cubs and Scouts sections. I'm confident that the new Venturers that have just entered the Company will do a fantastic job running the Venturer Section.
